Some of the older group are now having proper English lessons which is also helping the volunteers practice their Spanish. Both volunteers and children have been exceptionally patient with each other !

Aaron has also decided to stay with us for longer and is helping with foundation maintenance which has also helped to cut through Daniel's workload. We are also beginning work on new stables for the horses as part of the ecological building program. As ever we are very busy but that's exactly how we like it.



### **Chirikayen**

Chirikayen, nestled between the Grand Sabana and Chirikayen Tepui is a Pemónese indigenous town.

This month volunteer, Sally from Denmark went to visit the Pemón community for a week which is an open option for all volunteers.

Sally was met by the chief (the towns' only English speaker) in Santa Elena and then made the trip to the community, 1 hour away. She was hosted with a local family where she slept and ate during her stay. Spending time working in the school with the children Sally helped with the classes and taught them about her own background too.



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In her free time she was able to explore the beautiful countryside of the area. Between even attending church services and learning several Pemónese words there is plenty to do in even just one week.
